The Impact of Catholic Schools



During Christmas break, I was taking in some down time and watching a situational comedy. This particular show took place in an inner city. It was about a single mom with two children and a grandmother living in the same apartment. The two children were students who attended a Catholic school. One particular episode had a discussion about the Catholic church. The mom was always occupied with work, trying to support her children. While religion was important to her, her priority was supporting her kids, while the grandmother seemed to be the force keeping the family together through her faith. The children, while attending a Catholic school, were being nurtured through the cultural environment of the school. In this particular setting, the family was experiencing conflicts between secular and religious values. This conflict is common, especially in a fast-paced society. However, as the research shows below, Catholic schools do make a difference in the lives of their students.

Research on Catholic Schools

In 2014, a study conducted by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate of Georgetown, focused on the impact that Catholic schools in the United States had on their students in future generations. Surveys of these adults, ranging from those born from 1943 to 1982 or later indicate the following:

Church Attendance:

Adults who have attended a Catholic school sometime in their lifetime are more likely to attend weekly Mass as adults.

Involvement in the Church:

Adults who have attended a Catholic school sometime in their lifetime are more likely to consider the priesthood, religious life, or more likely to participate as lay ministers in a parish ministry.

Did you know that the ministry of St. Mary's School educates, feeds, provides child care and after school activities for \$22.00 per day per child (or \$3.85 per hour). All of this occurs; and at the same time the spiritual formation of children is nurtured.

ST. MARY'S ENDOWMENT FUND

In 1986 an educational endowment was set up for St. Mary's School. The purpose of St. Mary's Grade School Endowment Fund is to invest funds in which the proceeds of those investments go to support the ministry of St. Mary's School. Funds are invested with financial institutions. Today the total amount of funds invested is close to \$1.1 million. A separate endowment advisory board oversees the investment and recommends disbursements. Information about the endowment will be sent out later this month.

ITBS TESTS

Iowa Tests of Basic Skills are given to students in Grades K-6. Testing will begin on Monday, January 14th. Standardized tests help measure your children's progress. Their results are compared with those of kids at the same grade level nationwide. Schools also use the scores to see what areas of the curriculum may need to be strengthened. ITBS has completely updated their testing to reflect the new national standards. These tests usually cover many different subject areas. Doing homework regularly is one of the best ways your children can prepare. Results will be shared at PT conferences.

St. Francis de Sales


Born to a wealthy family in Savoy, near Switzerland, St. Francis became the Bishop of Geneva and worked to revive Catholicism in Chablais, Switzerland.

Controversial for his day, he taught that all Christians in whatever station in life could grow in holiness. He was known for his simple but profound sermons, and kindly spiritual wisdom. His famous work, *Introduction to the Devout Life*, is still a popular read today as it was when he wrote it.

Help your family have a Happy New Year

Eat healthier. Medical journals report that nine million children in the United States are obese or overweight. This year, try to avoid serving junk or overly processed foods and sit down together to family meals with average-sized portions of fresh, healthy foods.

Stay calm. Words can heal or hurt. Promise each other that you will avoid yelling and use only kind words.

Monitor input. Children absorb what they see and hear. Restrict what

your child watches on TV or plays on screens.

Keep moving. Go on family walks, bike rides, or go roller blading together. Find fun ways to get family exercise and spend more time together.

Read together more. Reading together at any age can increase attention span and provide time for closeness. Combine two great activities and read together from the Bible.

Seek the Sacraments. Our souls need Sacraments the way our bodies need nourishment. Through the Sacraments Jesus instituted, the Holy Spirit dispenses a share of divine life with each encounter. Resolve to receive Confession regularly as a family and let nothing come between you and the Eucharist on Sunday.



Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics need to share their faith?

Catholicism is about having a relationship with Jesus Christ, who shows God's love to us. God became man, died and rose from the dead, and re-opened Heaven for us. At Mass, he strengthens us with his Body

and Blood in the Eucharist. Our faith tells us that the perfect, infinite love we seek has a face and a name. Like the Woman at the Well, once we encounter Christ, we can't keep him to ourselves. We have to share him.



Assessment Program at St. Mary's School

St. Mary's Grade School follows a traditional curriculum. The basic core subjects of Religion, Math, and Language Arts are integrated with Science, Social Studies, and Data Analysis.

In today's educational conversations, there is a great emphasis on "academic growth" and preparing students for the next level.

For over 40 years, St. Mary's Grade School has been committed to monitoring academic growth in Grades K-6. Data collected from assessments are for both short and long term academic progress of individual students. The staff utilizes several tools to observe and analyze student advancement.

ACRE (Assessment of Catholic Religious Education) helps schools evaluate faith, knowledge, and attitudes of Catholic School students. This is administered in the 5th, 8th, and 11th grades.

DIBELS Reading which is individually administered, measures acquisition of early literacy skills in K-6. DIBELS Math is a brief evaluation of numeracy, computation, and problem solving skills in K-6. These two assessments are done three times a year.

ITBS (Iowa Tests of Basic Skills) is a national standardized assessment and is more comprehensive across the curriculum including Phonics, Reading, Math, Language (Spelling/Capitalization/Punctuation), Science (Life and Physical), and Social Studies (History, Economics and Civics). Results of the ITBS are shared with parents at **mid-year conferences. At the same time, individual student's academic growth from year to year is also reviewed and shared.** Starting in 2017, The ITBS will also provide predictive scores for ACT starting in Grade 6.

Kansas Assessments are summative assessments used to measure student knowledge based on the Kansas College Standards. Summative assessments are given towards the end of the year and can aid in reviewing curriculum and infrastructure.

SAFETY CONCERNS—PLEASE READ—IMPORTANT

MORNING TRAFFIC—In the morning when dropping off students to enter the All-Purpose Room please drive forward along the sidewalk. **Students from at least six-eight cars back can exit the right side of their vehicles (all at the same time) and walk on the sidewalk to enter the school.** Please do not use the circle drive. This will keep the traffic flowing more smoothly.

Recently there have been many cars entering the parking lot from Cloud St and not going around the loop. Stopping in the middle of the parking lot is **not safe for your child to exit.** It is also difficult for cars entering the lot, as it blocks the flow of traffic on Cloud St.

If you choose to park in a stall and drop off your children, it is the parent responsibility to see to it that students use the crosswalks.

After school, we hope drivers take the responsibility of parking correctly and driving slowly, **but students also need to use the crosswalks** and walk carefully to their cars. Cars should not stop in the driving area to pick up their child(ren). This is why, in the winter, when we get snow—students will not be allowed to be throwing snowballs before or after school; nor be allowed to be climbing on snow mounds. We appreciate parents' support.

Reminder that cell phone use is prohibited when dropping off and picking up children. This is for the safety of our students.
